

ANNUAL REPORT.

Election of Hon. Librarian.—On the 16th June, 1921, Mr. R. Bolton McCausland was unanimously re-elected as Hon. Librarian.

Sir Conway Dwyer.—On the 16th June, 1921, the Council congratulated Sir Conway Dwyer on the honour His Majesty the King had seen fit to confer upon him.

Alterations in Bye-Laws and Ordinances.—The following Bye-laws and Ordinances are now in force :—

CONCERNING THE COLLEGE.

1. The Common Seal of the College shall consist of ^{Seal.} Armorial Bearings, Crests, Supporters and Mottoes of the College, as registered in His Majesty's College of Arms, of which a facsimile is here given. The Seal shall be affixed to all Diplomas and other Public Acts of the College by the President, or in his absence by the Vice-President, or two Members of the Council, and in accordance with a resolution of the Council.



2. The Coat-of-Arms of the College shall be that of which a facsimile is here given, and the same may be used by the College on and for all proper occasions and purposes.

3. At General Meetings of the College all the Fellows shall take their places when the College proceeds to business; and when any Fellow speaks he shall stand up and address himself to the Chairman, and the rest shall remain silent; and when two or more offer to speak at the same time the Chairman shall determine who shall speak first; and no Fellow shall speak more than once upon the same question, unless in reply or to order, or when called upon by the President to explain. At such General Meetings the College shall proceed to take the order or orders of the day into consideration before any new matter be proposed or debated.

Oaths of Affirmation to be taken within one month.

4. Every person elected or appointed to an office in the College shall take the oath, or make the affirmation prescribed in the Charter for such office within one calendar month after his election or appointment; otherwise such election or appointment shall be void, and the College or Council, as the case may be, shall proceed to a new election.

Ballot Lists for Council.

5. Any Fellow who wishes his name to be placed on the printed lists of Candidates for Membership of the Council is required to give at the least ten days' notice in writing prior to date of election to the Registrar of the College of such his wish.

Fellows not to receive money from the College.

6. It shall not be lawful to make any dividend, gift, division, or bonus in money, unto or between any of the Fellows. Provided, however, that nothing in this Bye-Law contained shall prevent the payment of fees or salaries to Fellows who may be Professors, Examiners, Members of the Committee of Management for Conjoint Examinations with the Royal College of Physicians of Ireland, members of a deputation, or paid officials of the College.

Candidates for office not to canvass.

7. It shall not be lawful for any Candidate for any office or appointment under the College to canvass either directly or indirectly for such office or appointment.

CONCERNING THE COUNCIL.

Council Meetings.

8. The Council shall meet from time to time, as may be necessary, for the transaction of business of the College, such Meetings to be convened by summons.

Honorary Fellowships.

9. It shall be lawful for the Council to elect, from time to time, as Honorary Fellows such persons as have eminently distinguished themselves in the Science of Surgery, or in any of the branches of knowledge auxiliary thereto; but the Diplomas of such election shall be presented to such persons free of expense, and shall not confer any corporate privileges.

10. No person shall be proposed for election as an Honorary Fellow of the College save on the nomination of a Committee consisting of the President and Past Presidents; such nomination shall be by notice of motion, to be handed in at one Meeting of the Council, and considered at the next Meeting.

CONCERNING OFFICERS OF THE COLLEGE.

11. A Registrar shall be elected by the Council, Registrar. from time to time, as a vacancy may occur, and shall hold his situation during the pleasure of the Council. Should such Registrar, so elected, be a Member of the Council, he shall thereupon cease to hold the office of Councillor; and if at any time he be elected a Councillor, he shall not be capable of being elected or acting as Registrar. The duties of the Registrar shall be to keep the Accounts and Minute Books of the College, of the Council, and of the School, to superintend the non-professional staff of the College, and to perform such other duties as may be from time to time laid down for him by the Council.

12. A Clerk may be elected by the Council, from Clerk. time to time, as a vacancy may occur, and shall hold his situation at the pleasure of the Council. Should such Clerk, so elected, be a Member of the Council, he shall cease to hold the office of Councillor; and if at any time he be elected a Councillor, he shall not be capable of being elected or acting as Clerk. The duties of such Clerk shall be to assist the Registrar in the discharge of his duties, to take his place when absent, and to perform such other duties as may be from time to time laid down for him by the Council.

13. An Honorary Librarian, who shall be a Fellow Librarian. of the College, shall be elected annually by the Council, whose duty it shall be to superintend the Library, and carry into effect the directions of the Council with respect thereto.

14. The number of a Deputation to represent the Deputations College in London or elsewhere away from Dublin and pay- shall not exceed two in addition to the President or ment of Vice-President. The sum payable to each Member of Delegates. a Deputation shall not exceed as a viaticum the first-class return fare; and as an honorarium, five guineas for each day during which the Delegate shall be unavoidably absent from home transacting the business of the College; one additional day's honorarium being allowed for the time occupied in travelling; expenditure on cabs, telegrams, and postage for College business shall be specially accounted for, and paid by the College, but so that no payment shall be made either

as a viaticum, honorarium, or refund of expenditure, unless such payment shall have been considered and approved by the Council at the time of the appointment of the Deputation.

15. The Professors of the College shall be the following:—One Professor of Anatomy, one Professor of Physiology, one Professor of Surgery, one Professor of Medicine, one Professor of Pharmacology, one Professor of Midwifery, one Professor of Preventive Medicine and of Medical Jurisprudence, one Professor of Pathology, one Professor of Biology, one Professor of Chemistry and Physics, one Professor of Rontgenology, one Professor of Dental Surgery, one Professor of Ophthalmic and Aural Surgery. The present holders of these Chairs shall remain in office until the Professorships respectively held by them shall be declared to be vacant by the Council of the College. All persons appointed in future to be Professors of the College shall hold office only during the pleasure of the Council.

Nothing in these Bye-Laws shall affect the tenure of office of existing Professors.

Advertisement of
Vacancy.

Notice of a vacancy in an existing Professorship or of the foundation of a new Professorship and of the day appointed for the election of a Professor to fill the vacancy shall be inserted three times in two of the Dublin newspapers at least fourteen days previously to such election.

Qualifica-
tion.

No person shall be eligible to be appointed a Professor in the School of the College unless he shall have obtained either a Degree in Medicine or a Diploma in Surgery from a University or College of Surgeons approved of by the Council, but such restriction shall not apply to Candidates for the Professorship of Chemistry and Physics.

No Member of Council shall be eligible as a Candidate for any Professorship in the School of the College unless he shall have resigned his office of Councillor not less than fourteen days previously to the election for the Professorship.

CONCERNING EXAMINERS.

16. Examiners in the subjects of General Education shall be or shall have been for at least three years prior to election Examiners in Arts in a University of the United Kingdom or in an Examining Body whose

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examination is accepted by a University of the United Kingdom as equivalent to its Matriculation or Entrance Examination. Examiners in Surgery shall be Fellows of this College or Fellows of the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh or London, or Graduates in Surgery in any University of the United Kingdom recognized by the College. Examiners in Medicine shall be Fellows or Members of the Royal College of Physicians of Ireland or Fellows of the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh or London, or Graduates in Medicine of any University in the United Kingdom recognized by the College. All other Examiners shall be such persons as the Council shall consider suitable.

No person who is engaged in private teaching shall be eligible as an Examiner, and if any Examiner shall engage in such teaching, he shall thereby render his election null and void. Examiners not to be Private Teachers.

No more than three Members of the Teaching Staff of any one Clinical Hospital shall be eligible to obtain seats on the Courts of Examiners of the Conjoint Board in Ireland of the Royal College of Physicians and the Royal College of Surgeons; and no more than two of such Members shall be eligible to act as Examiners at the Final Examination of the said Conjoint Board or at the Final Examination for Fellowship of the College. Not more than three Examiners from one Hospital.

Persons elected and appointed to fill the office of Examiner shall hold and enjoy their said office only during the pleasure of the Council. Tenure of Office.

CONCERNING EDUCATION.

17. All applications for admission as Students who have not attained a standard of education sufficient in the opinion of the Council to entitle them to exemption therefrom shall pass a Preliminary Examination in subjects of General Education. Qualification of persons applying for admission as Students in General Education.

18. Preliminary Examinations in subjects of General Education such as shall be from time to time approved by the Council shall be held at such times and places as the Council shall from time to time direct. Preliminary Examinations.

19. No Fellow or Licentiate shall commit, do, or suffer any act or thing which shall result in his or her being convicted, either in His Majesty's Dominions or

elsewhere, of an offence which, if committed in Ireland, would be a felony or misdemeanour, or commit, do, or suffer any act or thing which shall result in his or her name being erased from the Medical Register by the General Council of Medical Education and Registration of the United Kingdom, or be guilty of any infamous conduct in any professional respect, or be guilty of a breach of the declaration taken by him or her for the purpose of obtaining his or her Diploma or Letters Testimonial, or commit, do, or suffer any act or thing which the Council shall by resolution have declared to be inconsistent with or prejudicial to the reputation, honour, or dignity of the College.

ORDINANCES OF THE COUNCIL.

CONCERNING THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE COLLEGE BY THE COUNCIL.

1. At Ordinary Meetings of Council the President shall take the chair, or, in his absence, the Vice-President, or, in the absence of both, the Member of Council present who may be senior on the College List of Fellows; and business shall be transacted in the following order:—

Order of

(a) The Secretary shall read the proceedings of the previous meeting. (b) The Chairman of the day shall sign the Minute Book. (c) The Accounts as audited by the Finance Committee shall be submitted. (d) Letters and other communications shall be read. (e) Reports of Committees shall be presented. (f) Motions, of which notice has been given, shall be discussed. (g) Notices of Motions, for consideration at future meetings, shall be received and filed.

It shall be competent for the President to refer any question to a Standing Committee for report to the Council.

2. There shall be four Standing Committees—
(a) Finance Committee, (b) Education Committee, (c) Examination Committee, (d) General Purposes Committee—each consisting of a Chairman, four Councillors, and *ex-officio* Members. Three shall form a quorum.

Standing
Committees

The President, Vice-President, and Secretary of the College shall be *ex-officio* Members of all Committees. The Librarian shall be an *ex-officio* Member of the Education Committee; the representative of the College on the General Medical Council, if a Member of College Council, shall be an *ex-officio* Member of the Examination and General Purposes Committees; and the Chairmen of the Education, Examination, and General Purposes Committees shall be *ex-officio* Members of the Finance Committee. All Members of

Council are privileged to be present at the meetings of any Committee, but not to speak thereat without permission of the Chairman, nor to vote.

(a) FINANCE COMMITTEE:—The duty of this Committee shall be to superintend the outlay of all moneys required for the service of the College, to audit all accounts, and to report to the Council upon every matter connected with the expenditure of the College; also to superintend the management of the House Establishment of the College, to recommend such expenditure as they may deem necessary, and to audit the accounts, previous to payments by Council.

The President, or, in his absence, the Vice-President, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, and the three senior Councillors on that Committee, shall together form a Treasury Sub-Committee, whose names shall be returned to the College Bankers; and whose duty shall be to sign cheques for payment of accounts, when these shall have been passed by the Council.

(b) EDUCATION COMMITTEE:—The duty of this Committee shall be to supervise the management of the Library and Fellows' Room, and the performance of their duties by the Assistant-Librarian and Library Porters, to select books for purchase, to recommend such expenditure upon the Library as they may find necessary, and to audit the accounts of that department, previous to their being submitted to the Finance Committee for payment by Council.

To supervise the management of the Museum, and the discharge of their duties by the Curator and the Museum Porters, to recommend to the Council the purchase of such specimens or preparations as they consider suitable, and such other expenditure upon the department as they may find necessary, to examine such expenditure when ordered by the Curator, and to audit the accounts for same before their submission to the Finance Committee for payment by Council.

To inspect the School of the College from time to time, to investigate all matters connected therewith, and report to Council thereupon when necessary.

(c) EXAMINATION COMMITTEE:—The duty of this Committee shall be to inquire into the evidences of study and other qualifications presented by candidates for Examinations, and to authorize for admission thereto those whose qualifications are in conformity with the requirements of the College; to supervise the Examinations conducted by the College, and to report on same to the Council; to report at least once

annually on the regulations for the various Diplomas and Licences granted directly by the College, and to suggest to the Council such alterations as the Committee think desirable. And further, their duty shall be to inquire into and report to Council upon all matters relating to education and examination which may be remitted to them, and to do all such acts thereupon as may be authorized or required by Council.

(d) GENERAL PURPOSES COMMITTEE:—The duty of this Committee shall be to inquire into and report upon all Medico-Political and Parliamentary matters which, in the opinion of the Committee, should be reported to the Council; to draft the annual report of the Council, and to inquire into, and when necessary to report upon, any charges of misconduct made against Fellows or Licentiates of the College; and to report upon all such matters as may be remitted to them, and to do all such acts thereupon as may be authorized or required by the Council.

The Chairmen and Members of all Standing Committees shall be elected by Council by ballot.

CONCERNING THE COLLEGE OFFICERS.

3. At all elections of a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary of the College, or a Councillor or Councillors, in case the number of duly qualified candidates for each such office, who shall have sent in their names within the period required by the Charter, is not greater than the number of vacancies, it shall not be necessary to issue voting papers to the Fellows; and the presiding Chairman, at the meeting of the College which has been convened for the election, shall declare the candidates so presenting themselves duly elected.

At all elections of a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary of the College, or a Councillor, or Councillors, the Presiding Chairman may order that the scrutiny of the voting papers shall commence when at least thirty voting papers shall have been placed in the ballot box, and that it shall continue until the scrutiny is completed, provided always that the box shall at no time, before the close of the ballot, contain less than twenty papers.

4. No appointment to any office shall be made by the Council, unless due notice of the intention to make such appointment shall have been given at a

5. For the purpose of the election of a representative of this College in the General Medical Council, the names of Fellows willing to serve in the office shall be sent to the Secretary of the Council at or before the first ordinary meeting of Council in January in each year; and the election, by ballot, shall take place at the next ordinary meeting of Council.

6. On the third Thursday in June, or as soon thereafter as may be, the Council shall elect Examiners, who shall not take up office until the first day of August in the same year.

The Courts of Examiners shall be constituted as follows:—

Court A. For examinations under the management of the Conjoint Committee, viz.:— Conjoint Licence, Licence in Surgery (for registered practitioners), Licence in Midwifery (for registered practitioners), Diploma in Public Health, and Preliminary.

One Examiner in Anatomy; Two Examiners in Surgery; One Examiner in Physiology and Histology; One Examiner in Pathology and Bacteriology; One Examiner in Midwifery and Gynæcology; One Examiner in Biology; Two Examiners in Ophthalmology; One Examiner in Chemistry and Physics; Two Examiners in Chemistry and Physics, for Diploma in Public Health only; One Examiner in Engineering and Architecture; One Examiner in Languages; One Examiner in Mathematics, Physics, Dictation, and English Essay; One Examiner in Dutch; One Examiner in Materia Medica, Pharmacy, and Therapeutics; One Examiner in Forensic Medicine and Public Health.

Court B. For Examinations conducted by the College, and not under the management of the Conjoint Committee, viz.: Fellowship, Licence in Dental Surgery.

Two Examiners in Anatomy, to examine in Surgery when directed; Four Examiners in Surgery, to examine in Anatomy when directed; Two Examiners in Physiology and Histology; Two Examiners in Pathology and Bacteriology; Two Examiners in Chemistry and Physics; Two Examiners in Dental Surgery and Pathology; Two Examiners in Mechanical Dentistry.

7. In the event of a majority of the Council deciding that the qualifications of the Candidates for any Examinership are such as to make a postponement of the election desirable, it shall be within the power of the Council to postpone such election.

At all elections held by the Council, each member of Council shall vote for that number of Candidates for which there are vacancies. Voting papers containing a greater or lesser number of names shall be invalid. The Candidate or Candidates having the fewest votes shall be struck off the list, and the remaining names again submitted to ballot.

Method of election of Officers by the Council.

This process shall be repeated until the number has been reduced to that for which there are vacancies.

If any Candidate shall be appointed as an Examiner in one subject, his name shall not be submitted for Examinership in another subject.

8. A Curator of the College Museum shall be appointed, who shall hold office during the pleasure of the Council, and receive such salary as the Council shall from time to time determine.

The Curator of the Museum.

The Curator shall not hold any other office of emolument without the special permission of the Council, to be granted only after a fortnight's notice of motion has been given.

Not to hold other office.

9. The Curator shall, in all respects, be subject to the directions of the Education Committee, and shall keep the Committee informed of all things relating to the efficiency of the Museum.

Duties of Curator.

The Curator shall be required to enter in the catalogue all new preparations, with such descriptions of them as may be necessary to make them available for instruction.

Catalogue.

The Curator shall, at the end of every quarter, lay before the Education Committee for the information of the Council such preparations as he shall have made during that period, and a statement in detail of all works executed and duties performed by him during that period. He shall, before the third Thursday in June, in each year, present to the Council, through the Committee, a statement of the duties he has performed, and the preparations and repairs he has made during the year. After the reading of such statement, a motion, if made and seconded, shall be put by the President, that the Curator shall be re-elected, and a ballot shall be taken thereon.

10. If, at any time, the Curator shall be elected a Member of Council, and shall accept such office, and make the declaration required to be made by Councillors, he shall, *ipso facto*, vacate his situation as Curator, and shall be ineligible as a candidate for that office as long he remains a member of Council.

11. The Assistant-Librarian shall be responsible for the safe custody of the Books. His salary shall be such as the Council shall, from time to time, determine; and he shall be required to find security to the amount of £100. His duties shall be defined by the Education Committee subject to the approval of the Council.

12. One member of the Examination Committee shall be summoned to each Examination, at which he shall act as Visitor, and shall be summoned to the Conference when such takes place.

13. No person, except a Fellow of the College, shall be permitted to be present at any Examination unless by the permission of the Visitor.

14. When a notice of any meeting of the College is forwarded to the Fellows, they shall be requested therein to send forthwith any motion which they propose to submit to the College; and such motions as may be received up to seven days before the meeting shall be printed in order of their reception for the information of the Fellows.

15. All specimens of Morbid Anatomy found in the dissecting-room are the property of the College, and shall therefore be placed by the Professor of Anatomy in the hands of the Curator of the Museum as soon as possible. All preparations made by Professors of the College or their Assistants while working in the College School shall be the property of the College.

16. An Ordinance or a Resolution of the Council shall not be altered or rescinded, nor shall any motion inconsistent with the same be considered by the Council, unless notice of such motion shall have been given in, at, or before the previous meeting of the Council, and unless the resolution of Council is observed which forbids the reliscussion of motions within three months; such motion shall appear in the summons for the day: Provided always, that the operation of this rule may be suspended if a motion for such suspension shall be passed by the Council without any dissentient.

Resolutions of Council.

The following recommendation to the Council was passed at a Meeting of the College held on May 30th, 1890, and was adopted at a Meeting of the Council on the 13th November, 1890:

That Vice-Presidents shall serve two years in that office before passing to the chair. A contest shall be discouraged in the case of a Vice-President seeking re-election to that office for a second year. When a President shall decline election for a second year, his successor shall be chosen from among the Past Presidents (if one can be found willing to serve), and no further service in the vice-chair shall be required of him.

Professorships.—On the 7th July the Council decided that the chairs of all part-time Professors who have on the 1st July, 1921, held office for five years or more shall be declared vacant. The chair of Surgery was declared vacant.

Election of Professor of Surgery.—On the 6th October, 1921, Mr. G. Jameson Johnston was appointed Professor of Surgery.

Election of Professor of Pharmacology.—On the 6th October, 1921, Dr. Robert J. Rowlette was appointed Professor of Pharmacology.

Election of Professor of Preventive Medicine and Medical Jurisprudence.—On the 6th October, 1921, Dr. Joseph W. Bigger was appointed Professor of Preventive Medicine and Medical Jurisprudence.

Purefoy Legacy.—The executors (Messrs. Alfred Miller and Herbert Dudgeon) of the will of Miss Purefoy handed £1,000, being the amount bequeathed by the deceased to the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland, to perpetuate the memory and to be at all times associated with the name of deceased's brother, the late Dr. Richard Dancer Purefoy, Past President and Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland, in the sole discretion of the Governing Body for the time being of the College. This sum is kept in a separate account until the Council decide as to the best form the Memorial should take.

Massy-Miles Donation.—A sum of £100 5 per cent. War Loan Stock was lodged with the Commissioners of Charitable Donations and Bequests for Ireland by Mrs. Charlotte E. J. Massy-Miles, to found a prize in the Royal College of Physicians of Ireland in memory of her husband, Captain Harry Godfrey Massy-Miles, m.c., to be awarded to the student who obtains the highest marks in the final examination in Midwifery and Gynæcology during the year.

Death of Dr. William Stoker.—The following resolution was adopted:—"The President, Vice-President, and Council of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland, having heard of the death of their friend and colleague, Dr. William Stoker, desire to express their sense of the loss the College has sustained, and to offer their deepest sympathy to his family in their sad bereavement."

Shekleton Microscope.—The Council gratefully accepted a microscope which is believed to have been the property of Dr. John Shekleton, sometime lecturer in Pathology to the Royal College of Surgeons, and best known as the first to describe the dissecting aneurism of the aorta, which consequently is sometimes called "Shekleton's Aneurism." The microscope has been in the possession of the Shekleton family, and was presented to the College by the grandnephew of the original owner, viz., Richard Auchmuty Shekleton, M.D., of Windmill House, Clapham Common, London, S.W.

Montgomery Lecture.—On 1st December, 1921, Professor Elliott Smith, F.R.S., was invited to deliver the Montgomery Lecture on 27th January, 1922.

Hon. Fellowships for American Surgeons.—The following report was received from the deputation :—

To the President, Vice-President, and Council of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland.

Gentlemen,

I have to report that, as deputed by you, Sir William Taylor and I left for America on October 7th, arriving in Philadelphia in time for the Congress of the American College of Surgeons, which occupied the week beginning October 24th. During our stay in Philadelphia Sir William Taylor was the guest of Dr. and Miss Keen, while I stayed with Dr. Richard Harte.

The ceremony of the presentation of the Honorary Fellowships took place before a very large audience on Friday evening, the 28th, immediately after His Eminence Cardinal Dougherty had performed the ceremony of invocation.

Dr. Harvey Cushing in a short address presented your representatives to the President (Dr. Deaver), Regents, Fellows, and guests of the College. Sir William Taylor then moved me into the chair, after which I, in turn, called upon him to present the new Honorary Fellows. This he did in a graceful and fitting speech, taking them in alphabetical order, as follows :—

I then formally admitted them in accordance with the ancient custom of the College, after which they donned their robes and

signed the roll. I subsequently explained to all those present the reason why I occupied the position that would ordinarily have been filled by the President, or in his absence, the Vice-President.

Dr. Keen then expressed, on behalf of himself and his colleagues, their appreciation of the compliment paid to American Surgeons generally, and to the recipients of the honour in particular. This done, Sir William Taylor moved me out of the chair, which was then retaken by Dr. Deaver.

Amongst those who subsequently received the Honorary Fellowship of the American College, I had the honour of being numbered (in this connexion it will be remembered that Sir William Taylor was similarly honoured last year). I recognize that in this a compliment was intended to my College rather than to myself; but I am none the less proud of being the channel through which that compliment was conveyed.

This terminated the proceedings as far as our official visit was concerned.

It is right that I should inform the Council that the impression we received during our visit was that the profession in America were in the highest degree appreciative of and grateful for the action of our College; and those principally concerned lost no opportunity of expressing themselves in these terms, and requesting that we would inform the President and Council to that effect on our return.

The function was one of the most brilliant we ever attended, and we consider ourselves more than rewarded for any little trouble it may have cost us by being privileged to attend it.

Subsequently, when in Chicago, Sir William Taylor and I received at a banquet given in our honour the honorary membership of the Physicians' Club of Chicago.

I cannot conclude without recording what a flattering and hospitable reception we, as your representatives, met with everywhere we went. Our hosts seemed to vie with one another in the generosity of their treatment; and we should be insensible, indeed, to the attentions they paid us and the honour they did us if we did not acknowledge it with deep appreciation and gratitude.

The Vice-President, Sir William Ireland de Courcy Wheeler, was unavoidably prevented at the last moment from accompanying the deputation.

Charter Day Dinner.—On 19th January, 1922, it was decided to postpone the Charter Day Dinner.

Office of Representative on the General Medical Council.—On the 19th January, 1922, Sir Arthur Chance was unanimously elected to represent the College for one year at the meetings of the General Medical Council.

Dental Board.—On the 19th January, 1922, permission was given to the Dental Board of the United Kingdom to hold their examinations in the College halls.

The Dental Board of the United Kingdom invited the Council to nominate three Examiners. The following gentlemen were nominated on the 20th April, 1922 :—

- Daniel L. Rogers.
- George Sheppard.

Income Tax.—A refund of Income Tax amounting to £774 18s. 9d. was obtained ; and the Council passed a special vote of thanks to Mr. Miller for the success which attended his efforts in this matter.

Professor Sir William Taylor, K.B.E., C.B.—On the 1st June, 1922, the Council congratulated Sir William Taylor on his appointment as Regius Professor of Surgery to Trinity College, Dublin.

Royal Veterinary College.—Certain specimens from the Museum were lent to the foregoing Institution.

University of Padua.—An invitation was read from the University of Padua, asking the President and Council to send a representative to their celebrations to be held in May, 1922. On the 16th March Sir Robert Woods was nominated to represent the College.

Death of the President, Mr. Edward H. Taylor.—On 4th May, 1922, the following resolution was adopted :—

“ That at this first meeting of the Council since the lamented death of Mr. Edward H. Taylor, President of the College, the Vice-President, Secretary, and Council of the College wish to place on record the sad loss the College has sustained by his demise, and offer to his family their deep and heartfelt sympathy in their bereavement.”

The Council did not transact any business, and adjourned out of respect to the memory of Mr. Edward H. Taylor.

Speaking at a meeting held in the College, the Vice-President (Sir Wm. Wheeler) alluded to the death of the President in the following terms :—

“ The Surgical Section of the Royal Academy of Medicine meets under the shadow of Mr. Edward Taylor’s death. He was President of the section and President of the College in which we meet. He himself would have wished us to proceed with the business before us, for the progress of surgery was near to his heart, and he knew that the published Transactions of this section did much towards maintaining the reputation of the Dublin school in Great Britain and abroad. None of us, however, will feel disposed to proceed to ordinary business on the eve of his funeral. Our minds are burdened with the loss we have suffered, and we are full of sympathy for the widow and family he has left behind.

“ The profession is indebted to Edward Taylor for the demonstration of the fundamental truth that success and respect, and everything in professional life which can be considered worth while, can be obtained by taking the straight road. Success to him meant hard work and results conscientiously achieved for the good of the school, for the advance of science, and for the benefit of all. Success was his, and his efforts were crowned by recognition from Dublin University, from the College of Surgeons, and from the profession at large. Thus he became President of this College unopposed ; he was selected to follow E. H. Bennett as Professor of Surgery, and later to succeed Sir Chas. Ball as Regius Professor, in the Medical School of Dublin University. He received the degree of Master of Surgery (*honoris causá*) as a final tribute from the school in which he was reared. His books on operative surgery and applied anatomy breathe infinite accuracy, perseverance, and truth, and deservedly won him a high reputation in foreign lands. By his writings much was done to lift Irish surgery into the first rank. It gave a thrill of pride when travelling to find Edward Taylor’s name on the lips of the great contemporary surgeons, and his works quoted by the writers of the day.

“ His long illness prevented his taking part as President in College affairs, unless for a few early months of office. It was during this time I became acquainted with the personal charm and indefinable qualities which accounted for his popularity amongst those with whom he freely moved. He was open-minded and just ; if he was capable of injustice, it was to himself, for he was

pre-eminently modest. He stood for loyalty in friendship; in work he ranked co-operation high above checkmate, and vigorously assisted in every forward move. He had a quiet dignity which added weight to his words, and although he may have lacked some of the frills and flashes of genius, he was one of those men who got things done. Apart from his large circle of friends, he was able to attract and stimulate the wider circle of those about him, and this was one of his most winning powers. Outstanding ability, real work, and honest effort brought their rewards. In addition to academic honours and general respect, his qualities as a surgeon received public favour, and he enjoyed a large share of the practice of Southern Ireland. The surgical torch in this Academy has been dimmed for the moment, but this section can do honour to a memory by fanning the flame into brightness and illuminating for others the path by which the late President found his way."


