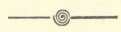

## College.

### *Royal Visit to Ireland.*

On the occasion of their Majesties' visit to Ireland in July, 1903, the following address was presented by the President and Vice-President at Dublin Castle :—

TO HIS MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY EDWARD THE SEVENTH OF THE UNITED KINGDOM OF GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND AND OF THE BRITISH DOMINIONS BEYOND THE SEAS, KING, DEFENDER OF THE FAITH, AND EMPEROR OF INDIA; AND TO QUEEN ALEXANDRA.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR GRACIOUS MAJESTIES,

We, the President, Vice-President, and Council of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland, beg most respectfully to offer you our loyal and cordial congratulations on the auspicious occasion of your Majesties' first visit to Ireland since your accession to the Throne.

Not the least devoted of your Majesties' subjects are the Members of this ancient College, founded in 1784 by your august ancestor, King George III.

For nearly a century and a quarter the College has furnished highly-trained Surgeons for the Navy, Army, and the Civil Service.

Your subjects are profoundly sensible of and grateful for the continuous and active interest which your Majesties take in projects having for their object the betterment of the people, the alleviation of human suffering in disease, and the general welfare of the Nation.

It is our earnest hope that the cordial Irish welcome which your Majesties' are receiving may induce you to repeat a visit which cannot fail to promote the prosperity and happiness of this portion of your Majesties' great Empire.

The College was illuminated on the evening of their Majesties' entrance into Dublin, and the Council sent a subscription of Ten Guineas to the Reception Committee, who had charge of the decoration of the streets.

### *New Hall.*

At the Annual Meeting of the College last May, Sir Charles Cameron, Secretary of the College, mentioned that the Council proposed to convert the present Anatomical Museum into an Examination Hall. A Committee was appointed to go into the various details and consider how the cost could best be provided for.

The Building Committee reported that the estimated cost of the proposed new Hall will be £2,378.

The work is now being carried out, and it is expected that the new Hall will be completed by the end of June.

The following correspondence passed with reference to this privilege, which had been granted to the President of the College by Lord Londonderry when Viceroy in 1887 :—

DUBLIN CASTLE,  
28th January, 1904.

SIR,

Owing to the limited accommodation, and the way in which the Private Entrée has been increasing within recent years, it has become absolutely necessary to curtail the list, which is now being practically limited to Heads of Government Departments.

I am directed by the Lord Lieutenant to inform you that while the Private Entrée is to be extended to you during your tenure of office, His Excellency regrets that the privilege cannot be continued to your successors in office in future, having regard to the absolute necessity for the reduction of the list.

THE PRESIDENT OF THE ROYAL COLLEGE

After some correspondence with Lord Plunket, Private Secretary to Lord Dudley, it was resolved at a Special Council Meeting, held on February 23rd, to send the following letter to Lord Dudley :—

ROYAL COLLEGE OF SURGEONS IN IRELAND,  
DUBLIN, Feb. 23rd, 1904.

MY LORD,

I am directed by the President, Vice-President, and Council of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland, to acknowledge the receipt of your Lordship's letter of the 7th February, 1904; and to request that your Lordship would be good enough to send them the "more formal" letter referred to therein.

The President and Council recognise without question His Excellency's right to grant or withdraw the privilege of the Private Entrée at his own discretion; and they wish it to be clearly understood that they have no intention of appearing as supplicants for any special favour to their elected representative; but they feel that justice to the profession which they represent compels them to lay the following facts and their views thereon before His Excellency.

The privilege was first granted to the College in the following letter :—

DUBLIN CASTLE,  
23rd May, 1887.

SIR,

I am directed by the Lord Lieutenant to inform you that His Excellency has been pleased to grant to the President of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland the privilege of the Private Entrée at the Court of Dublin.

His Excellency will see from this letter that the privilege was granted to the President by a former Viceroy *e proprio motu*, and doubtless was intended to express his appreciation of the work done by the Surgical Profession, and of the position which he thought its official Head should hold in public esteem.

The President, Vice-President, and Council feel that by the withdrawal of the honourable privilege enjoyed by the College for nearly seventeen years, His Excellency gives his sanction to the view that—at least in matters of Castle precedence—the leaders of their profession are inferior to those persons to whom the privilege is still granted.

There is such a large attendance of His Majesty's ministers and of foreign diplomatists at the Court of St. James that the Private Entrée is necessarily much restricted. If the rules regulating the Private Entrée at His Majesty's levees were rigidly applied to the Dublin Court, the number of those enjoying the Private Entrée here would be very small. But the President, Vice-President, and Council observe with regret that the rules governing the Private Entrée at His Majesty's levees have been adopted not in their entirety, but so far as to inflict an indignity upon the representative of their Profession.

They do not recognise the justice of the contention that as a similar privilege has never been granted to the President of the Royal College of Surgeons in London, that granted to their President in 1887 should now be withdrawn.

Nor does the overcrowding of the Private Entrée affect the rights of those who were given the privilege before the overcrowding took place.

The President, Vice-President, and Council have learned with pain and astonishment that His Excellency, who has so eloquently spoken in terms of generous appreciation of the work done by Irish surgeons, has, by his recent decision—doubtless without intention—put the representative of Irish Surgery in a position of humiliating inferiority.

It is because they believe that His Excellency has acted on an insufficient acquaintance with the circumstances of the case that they venture to lay the foregoing statement before His Excellency.

*Inspection of the Examination for the Conjoint Licenses.*

Sir J. B. Tuke was deputed by the General Medical Council to inspect the Third Professional Examination held in April, 1903. His Report was most flattering, and ends with the following paragraph:—

I followed seven candidates through their Examination, and felt quite satisfied that they had been well tested, and that the awards of the Examiners were fair, and fully justified.

The First Professional Examination, held in July, 1903, was also inspected, and the Reports of the visitors were equally satisfactory.

*Election of Representative of the College on the General Medical Council.*

At the First Meeting in February the Council again elected Sir Charles Ball to fill this office for the ensuing year.

*Professorship of Materia Medica.*

Owing to the death of Sir George Duffey, this Professorship became vacant. On December 18th, 1903, the Council elected Mr. Michael M'Hugh, L.R.C.S.I., M.A., M.D., Dub., to fill the vacant chair.

*License Cancelled.*

At the Council Meeting on May 7th, 1903, the letters-testimonial of Mr. William Arthur Jones were declared void, and his name was removed from the list of Licentiates. The General Medical Council had removed his name from the Medical Register on November 27th, 1902.

*Gaelic League.*

The Council, at their Meeting on October 8th, received a Deputation from the Gaelic League, who urged that Irish should be included in the list of Optional Subjects for the Preliminary Examinations. The College has agreed to adopt the suggestion.

*Meetings held in the College.*

The Council permitted Meetings of the Irish Branch of the British Dental Association, Irish Medical Association, Royal Academy of Medicine in Ireland, the Medical Benevolent Fund, the Medical Temperance Society, the Clinical Club, and the Bazaar Committee in aid of Mercer's Hospital, to be held in the College.

*Votes of Congratulations.*

At a meeting of the Council, held on October 8th, 1903, the President, Sir Lambert Ormsby, was congratulated by the Council on receiving the honour of knighthood on August 26th, 1903.

On May 21st, 1903, the Council congratulated Mr. P. G. Garland, L.R.C.S.I., Senior Medical Officer, Northern Territories, West Coast of Africa, on his mention in *The London Gazette* of April 4th for bravery and efficiency in the discharge of his duties.

On March 24th, 1904, the Council passed a vote congratulating Dr. A. Traill on his appointment as Provost of Trinity College, this being the first occasion on which a member of the medical profession held this exalted office.

*College Dinner.*

The annual dinner was held on February 13th, which was honoured by the presence of His Excellency Earl Dudley.

*Barker Prize for 1903.*

This Prize was awarded to Mr. A. N. Crawford, a pupil in the College School.

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**Obituary.***Death of Mr. Henry Gray Croly.*

On the 8th October, 1903, the lamented death of Mr. Henry Gray Croly, Ex-President and late Member of the Council, was reported. It was unanimously resolved :—

That this Council has learned with regret of the death of Mr. H. G. Croly, a former President of the College, and desires to express their sincere condolence with his family.

*Death of Sir Philip Crampton Smyly.*

On the 21st April, 1904, the Council received intelligence of the lamented death of Sir Philip Crampton Smyly, Ex-President and Senior Member of the Council. It was unanimously resolved :—

That at this first Meeting of the Council since the lamented death of the late Sir Philip Smyly, Member of the Council, and Past-President of the College, the President, Vice-President, and Council beg to offer to Lady Smyly and members of her family their heartfelt sympathy in her sad bereavement.

*Death of Dr. Austin Meldon, D.L.*

On the 3rd of May, 1904, the Council, having been informed of the lamented death of Dr. Austin Meldon, D.L., Ex-President and Member of the Council, it was unanimously resolved :—

That at this first Meeting of the Council since the lamented death of Dr. Austin Meldon, Member of Council, and Past-President of the College, the Council beg to offer Mrs. Meldon and her family their heartfelt sympathy and condolence in their sad and unexpected bereavement.
