ANNUAL REPORT

June, 1932.—Mr. W. C. P. Smyly was unanimously re-elected Hon. Librarian.

The Council decided to present, for annual competition, a gold medal, of value from three to five guineas, amongst the members of the Biological Association.

Mary Louisa Prentice Montgomery Lecture.—Two lectures were delivered, one by Dr. Golding and one by Mr. Whiting.

22nd October, 1932.—The President (Mr. Frank Crawley) declared the new Sports Ground open at Clonskeagh in the presence of a large number of Fellows and visitors. The Lord Mayor (Rt. Hon. A. Byrne) in a very happy speech congratulated the President and Council on having such fine grounds, and he wished the venture every success.

Sir William Taylor unveiled a memorial to the late Dr. John A. Scott, who was Professor of Physiology and Histology in the Schools of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland. The memorial took the form of a well-equipped First Aid Cabinet, which is placed in the pavilion at the Sports Ground, Clonskeagh. Sir William said—"Scott was a man of extraordinary versatility of mind. He was a physicist, a physiologist, a biologist, and a pathologist, and, in addition, for over fifty years he was a great authority on photography. He did an extraordinary amount of photographic research work, and perfected by mathematical methods the exposures necessary for each hour of every day of the year. This he did by calculating mathematically the rate of absorption of the light due to the position of the sun. This was recognised as one of the greatest scientific achievements in photography.

"Scott's scientific work was done purely from his love of science, and he never commercialised any of it. Transparently honest himself, he was a good friend to all honest men, but an uncompromising enemy of quacks and humbugs."

December, 1932.—The Council regret to record the death of their friend and colleague, Mr. Louis A. Byrne, who was for so many years a member of the Council. A resolution of sympathy was sent to the relatives of the late Mr. L. A. Byrne.

12th January, 1933.—Sir William Taylor was unanimously elected to represent the College at the meetings of the General Medical Council.

29th January, 1933.—It is with profound regret that the Council record the loss they have sustained through the death of their friend and colleague, Sir William Taylor. The following is an extract from the *Irish Journal of Medical Science* :—

IN MEMORIAM.

SIR WILLIAM TAYLOR (1871–1933).

“In October, 1889, there entered the Schools of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland a youth who was to prove himself to be one of the best—in every sense of the word—who ever joined that body. His name was William Taylor.

“During his student course, he won the Gold Medal in Operative Surgery and the Mayne Scholarship. In 1893 he qualified as a Licentiate of the Royal Colleges. He took his Fellowship of the Royal College of Surgeons in 1898. He was elected a Member of Council of the College four years later. In the same year, 1902, he proceeded to his M.B. degree in the University of Dublin.

“He speedily proved himself to be a capable teacher, demonstrating in anatomy for several years, and preparing in private many candidates for the F.R.C.S.I. examination.

“Very shortly after qualification he was appointed Assistant Surgeon to the Meath Hospital, and, in 1900 he became full surgeon.

“On the outbreak of the War, he was appointed Consulting Surgeon to the Forces in Ireland, with the rank of full colonel in the Army Medical Service. This post he held for six years, during which period he was one of the most active surgeons on the staff of the Dublin Castle Red Cross Hospital.

“In 1917, from amongst the senior members of the staffs of the Dublin hospitals he organised a hospital staff for service in France—the 83rd (Dublin) General Hospital, stationed at Boulogne, with whom he served actively for three months. His energy and gifts of organisation were recognised by the bestowal of a C.B. in 1917 and a K.B.E. in 1918.

“On the death of Professor Edward Taylor in 1922, Sir William was appointed Regius Professor of Surgery in Dublin University, and Surgeon

to Sir Patrick Dun's Hospital. Amongst the other hospital appointments which he held in Dublin were those of Consulting Surgeon to the Coombe Lying-in Hospital, to Steevens' Hospital, and to the Incorporated Dental Hospital of Ireland.

"His extensive travels in Canada and the United States made for him a host of friends overseas. McGill University conferred upon him her LL.D. *honoris causa*, and the American College of Surgeons elected him one of their Honorary Fellows.

"Further honours were to be bestowed upon him nearer home. He had been elected President of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland in 1916. He was the President of the Association of Surgeons of Great Britain and Ireland for the session, 1924-25, and in 1927 he was elected to the Presidency of the Royal Academy of Medicine in Ireland.

"From the time of his first election, he attended the meetings of the Council of the Royal College of Surgeons, and the numerous committees on which he served, with unflinching regularity. Nor did he suffer his many duties in the University of Dublin to interfere in any way with his zealous support of the College of Surgeons. Both bodies owe much to his fostering care. No more helpful member of Council was ever elected. *De minimis curavit Gulielmus*—even to a new show case in the College museum. Nothing that affected the welfare of the College was too small to escape his attention. He has set an example that may well be followed by those of us who are left behind to carry on—as energetically as we may—his splendid work.

"William Taylor came to us from the North, and to the end of his days he remained a Northerner—in voice, in accent, in unflinching directness of opinion. Yet he could see other people's points of view and if, after argument, he agreed with them, none could do so more whole-heartedly. Nor was there ever a more loyal friend. There can be no doubt that all those who, since 1898, had been his pupils in the College feel, wherever they may be, the deep personal loss of a true and trustworthy friend.

"To Lady Taylor and to his children is tendered our deepest sympathy.

6th April, 1933.—Sir Thomas Myles was elected to represent the College at the meetings of the General Medical Council.

Museum.

GENTLEMEN,

Since my last report the work in this department has made a distinct advance. By the provision of an adequate supply of suitable glass jars, the proper mounting and preservation of specimens in colour have become possible. The stimulus of the recent meeting of the Association of Physicians in Dublin led to the production of good glass fronted cases for the exhibition of the specimens. The general arrangement and appearance of these cases displayed by electric illumination won unstinted approval at the meeting, and I should like to express my thanks here to the Council of the College in general and to Mr. Alfred Miller in particular, for their generous help in promoting the success of this little exhibition.

The energy and enthusiasm of the assistant, Dr. Lewis, and the Laboratory staff were most encouraging.

The presentation of the pathological specimens in this way, together with a short descriptive catalogue, has increased the interest of the students in the subject; and a much wider use of the material has been made during the past year both for teaching and examination purposes. It is satisfactory to note that proper bench lights for microscopic work are now in course of installation; and when proper overhead electric lighting is added, this room will be a thoroughly satisfactory place to work in.
